Principal's Report

MADD (MUSIC, ART, DANCE AND DRAMA) NIGHT

Next Wednesday 24th August commencing at 6.30pm is MADD Night. I strongly encourage students, parents and staff to attend this stunning showcase of the project work of our Creative and Performing Arts students. The following evening commencing at 7.00pm is our Senior Soiree, which showcases the works of our HSC visual arts students. Both nights are wonderful celebrations of the school community in acknowledgement of the outstanding work of Forest High School students.

SENIOR CURRICULUM REVIEW

We have commenced a formal, external review of the senior curriculum and we will be finalising that review early in Term 1, 2017. Kim Jackson, the former Principal of Killarney Heights High School, is looking at a wide data set and will be surveying the school community and perhaps conducting some focus group interviews as well. I will keep you updated in relation to the findings of the review.

NAPLAN

NAPLAN results have been released this week and a quick analysis indicates that our students have generally performed very well. We will present the NAPLAN results to the P&C at the next meeting when we have had the opportunity to do a thorough analysis and I will also publish them in the next newsletter. All Year 7 and 9 students will receive their NAPLAN results this week or early next week and parents and carers should look out for them in school bags.

DETAILED DESIGN OF PROPOSED PROPERTY WORKS - THE FOREST HIGH SCHOOL

We now have the detailed design of the property works that will be undertaken by Ferrovial York (RMS's Contractor). The Department's Assets Management Unit and State Office have now signed off so the work can commence. The first works are likely to occur in the September holidays. The school grounds will be substantially enhanced through this project. I attended my first consultation with RMS and Health Infrastructure in 2012. I thank the school community, particularly the School Council and P&C parents, who have supported me and helped us to achieve this extremely positive outcome. Deputy Principal's Report

GETTING READY FOR THE HSC

The countdown is on for students preparing for the HSC. The trials are currently underway and this is a vital time for students to experience what the exams will be like. The feedback from their teachers will show them their strengths and weaknesses in knowledge and responses. The other important result of the trial exam is that it will finalise their class rank. This plays a very important part in the moderation of assessment marks, which accounts for 50% of their final result. Even if students have not performed as well as they could, they can still achieve a good result through study for the actual exam itself and performance on the day. That will lift their other 50% of the mark and as a class, students can have a positive effect on their moderated assessment. This is all explained in a document on the BOSTES website called 'How your HSC works'. I am happy to explain to parents and students as well if they need further information.

The BOSTES website has a lot of information to support students. Their own webpage 'Students Online' is where they can access their result, but it also provides them with their individualised timetable for the exams, access to past papers, markers' feedback and much more. There is information about the exams, study tips and even a test-yourself multiple choice section where students can try some actual exam questions and get instant feedback on how they went (not available for all subjects). There is an app which can be downloaded so students can access it on their phone.

In June BOSTES put out a **study guide through the Sydney Morning Herald** which was full of tips and information from past successful students. This is still available online and looks like the image below.



Lastly, the time after the trial and before the exams is vitally important for students. They need to be in class studying, practising and revising their work. Students who do not come to school or do not use their time wisely will be the ones who will be disappointed by their results.



Year 9 Report

Apart from interacting with Year 9 students on a daily basis, my greatest joy is to see all of the green slip merit awards being earned. Green slips may be given for a number of reasons determined by staff and reflect a commitment to upholding the school values of Respect, Responsibility and Personal Best.

The majority of Year 9 students wear correct school uniform. Parents are reminded that if students are not in full school uniform they must bring an explanation note on the day.

Students need to know that it is now too late to change elective subjects. This is due to the required number of hours to be taken in a subject for the Record of School Achievement (RoSA) to be awarded. As students are continually working towards the RoSA they need to be aware that if an 'N' determination warning has been issued for not completing the requirements of a course then action must be taken to address the concern in the letter sent home or risk not being eligible for the RoSA.

A number of Year 9 students have taken the opportunity to become involved in extra-curricular activities including the Solar Car Challenge, World challenge, High Resolves and hosting students from the visiting Chinese school. HSC

The 3+3 cohort have now completed their Trials and are gearing up for the HSC exams. Some students might still have one assessment task to complete but most will be focused on finishing their last topics and looking towards consolidating their understanding of the syllabus material and honing the skills necessary to maximise their marks in the HSC. It is vital that the students maintain focus right up to the end. These last couple of months are essential if the students are to achieve their potential in the exams. Please ensure their attendance at all lessons continues right up to the end of the term and encourage them to remain focused on their goals.

SRC

Year 11 students should be considering whether or not they would like to stand for election to the SRC and nominate for the various captain positions available. Being a captain or vice captain is a way for the students to have a real say in the way the school runs and also gives the students opportunities to become leaders and develop the skills associated with leadership. The process has changed slightly from previous years and is as follows:

- Friday 19th August nominations for the SRC close
- Thursday 25th August SRC election speeches are made at an assembly
- Friday 26th August successful Year 11 SRC candidates nominate for various executive positions (captains)
- 3.15 pm Tuesday 6th September candidates for executive positions make a 3 minute speech to staff
- Thursday 15th September candidates give speech to students. Students cast votes, school captains are announced
- Friday 16th September vice captains are announced. Thereafter other executive positions (eg: sports, performing arts and environment captains) are announced
- Wednesday 21st September induction ceremony for new captains (parents will be invited)



English

GENERAL

The English faculty has been working hard to implement a range of engaging units throughout the school. The faculty is working to develop a range of skills by embedding feedback strategies into a range of classes. In addition to receiving positive and constructive feedback from their teachers, students are also being taught how to undertake **peer evaluations** and provide one another with **feedback**. This process ensures that students have a strong understanding of the expectations and requirements for assessment tasks and specific text types that they need to compose. This process develops key evaluative skills that they will be able to apply when reflecting on their own work. Furthermore, this collaborative approach often fosters positive classroom environments.

NORTHERN BEACHES HOSPITAL COLLABORATION

Year 7 have been studying picture books and poetry and recently submitted their very own picture books that are directed towards future patients of The Northern Beaches Hospital. Students had to apply their knowledge of visual and narrative techniques to create a story that heals and inspires. Many students have expressed that they are very proud of their books and would like to keep a copy for posterity!

DEBATING

Mr de Montfort has been in charge of Debating for 2016 and regularly holds training sessions for a very dedicated and skilled group of students. The two Forest High School debating teams are enjoying great success in this year's **Premier's Debating Challenge**.

YEAR 7/8 TEAM

The Year 7/8 team of Oscar G., Vladimir L., Sam T. and Maddy S. prevailed over Pennant Hills High School. They developed and argued a convincing affirmative case for the challenging topic: 'that students who fail to report bullying should be suspended.' Our team presented a strong case line and fended off the negative arguments. This team will complete its round of debates this term with debates against the Pennant Hills High B team and Davidson High School over the next two weeks.

YEAR 9/10 TEAM

The Year 9/10 teams have successfully completed their first round debates with an emphatic win over Narrabeen Sports High School. Ariella O. joined the team and ensured the victory with her opening speech arguing the affirmative case for the topic: 'that we should have one year of compulsory national service for high school leavers.' This success builds on the lessons learned in the first debate that was narrowly lost against the Killarney Heights High School B team. The team chose to argue the affirmative case on the topic: 'that NAPLAN testing should be stopped.' A determined team entered the debate against the Killarney Heights A team and were victorious, arguing the negative case for the topic: 'that all sports should be required

to have a female commentator.' Congratulations to Zali S., Eliza J., Leeah B., Zali V. and Ariella O. who are now facing the next round of the competition.


COMPETITIONS

The English Department has been promoting several writing competitions this semester. The 'Write4Fun' competition is open until the end of August and is a fantastic opportunity for students to be creative and have fun undertaking a range of compositions. If your child is interested in this competition or any other, they can visit the noticeboard outside the English staffroom or they can speak to their English teacher or Mrs Fitzsimmons, who is now the Competitions Coordinator for 2016. Sophie V. and Elisha B. are to be commended on their outstanding results in the 'Australia My Country' competition that was officiated by the Forestville RSL Club. Sophie received 1st place and Elisha received 2nd place in the poetry section of the competition. These students should be very proud of their achievements!

INCURSIONS

At the end of Term 2, Year 9 had the opportunity to see **Philip Wilcox**, the current **Australian Poetry Slam Champion**. This experience coincided with a unit they were undertaking on performance poetry and the students expressed that they thoroughly enjoyed the incursion. They admired a range of language and delivery techniques that he used and were then able to apply them when composing and performing their own poems for an assessment task. **Bell Shakespeare** also visited the school at the end of Term 2 and performed for Years 9,10 & the HSC Advanced English classes. Students experienced live performances of various plays by William Shakespeare, with the performers aiding their understanding by providing clear explanations and analyses. In Week 6 of this term, Year 7, 9, 10 and HSC Standard English classes will be attending **Poetry in Action performances**, which aim to bring poetry to life for students. This will coincide with the HSC Standard cohort studying the poetry of Wilfred Owen, which will consolidate their understanding of his poems in the lead up to the HSC exams next term.

- •"The show was very entertaining and definitely worth seeing. A great day" (Tara M.)

MATHSWORKS - YEAR 8

The API Solar Car Challenge, hosted by The Forest High School, is nearing competition day, which takes place on the 23rd August.




The teams are currently in their final days of design and testing, ensuring their vehicles can meet the various challenges and showcasing their engineering and design capabilities.

May the best vehicle win!
















Forest High School students working on the API Solar Challenge

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL)

The Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) Committee has been meeting regularly and revising the behavioural expectations for non-classroom settings. All students are expected to maintain the school values of Respect, Responsibility and Personal Best in all settings. In all areas respect means being polite, respecting property, using appropriate language and following instructions from staff. All students have a responsibility to be safe at all times, to look after property, be environmentally aware and show courtesy to others. Regarding personal best, students should accept opportunities and challenges, always give their best effort and make good choices.

This term the school is focusing on correctly wearing the school uniform. When the uniform is worn properly this demonstrates respect for oneself as well as the school. Students demonstrate responsibility by being in correct school uniform as it makes students easily identifiable as belonging to the school rather than being an intruder. If students are not in correct school uniform they may be prevented from participating in events such as excursions, which then restricts their ability to do their personal best.

The wider community makes assumptions about the school which students attend based on their appearance and behaviour. It is important that students take pride in their appearance and behave appropriately whilst wearing The Forest High School uniform.

Other PBL focus areas will be:

- •To attend school regularly and to be on time to roll call and all lessons.
- •To speak appropriately to all members of the school community.
- •To take care and pride in our school grounds.

Teaching and Learning

TEACHER PROFESSIONAL LEARNING UPDATE

Teachers at The Forest High School regularly engage with professional learning opportunities to continually develop their expertise and practice. The focus for Term 3 so far has been on promoting a positive approach to the challenge of learning, promoting critical and creative thinking and providing effective feedback.

The Learning Challenge or Learning Pit is a framework put forward by educational researcher James Nottingham to help students see their learning as challenging but achievable, as well as promoting dialogue, collaboration and a growth mindset. In visiting The Forest High School, you may see some prints like the poster below that remind students that learning is hard, but that's OK. Like learning to ride a bike, we might make a few mistakes, fall off and feel frustrated, but by working hard, asking other learners and teacher experts for help, we can succeed. It is only when we give up that we fail.

Critical and creative thinking are vital skills that require students to use reason, logic, resourcefulness and imagination. Teachers at The Forest High School have been working with thinking and questioning toolkits such as Bloom's Taxonomy, The Thinker's Keys and The Williams Model. These frameworks are being reviewed to assist students in developing their understanding and acquiring of deep knowledge. While critical and creative thinking has always been happening at The Forest, Term 3 has seen a revisiting of this focus of learning, with time put aside for teachers to review the strategies that can be used and expand on them where doing so would help students.

Effective feedback has been identified as one of the most significant factors in improving student learning. Feedback for students comes in many forms: written, verbal, formal and informal. Any of these forms of feedback can be effective in promoting student learning, however, it is vital that students engage with the feedback they receive and attempt to implement the changes directed in later work. Teachers at The Forest have been looking at developing effective drafting processes for class and assessment tasks, to provide students with greater opportunities to work with peer and teacher feedback to learn and improve.

Education is at its most successful when students are supported both at school and at home. I would like to encourage you as parents and carers of students at The Forest High School to help us in these efforts. We are attempting to encourage students to embrace the challenge of learning, to think creatively and critically and to work hard at drafting and redrafting their work to improve. Any efforts made at home to reinforce these lessons would be invaluable to the learning of the students.





Tree clearing along Warringah Road, Wakehurst Parkway and Forest Way from Monday 15th August

The NSW Government is upgrading roads around the new Northern Beaches Hospital. Roads and Maritime Services will carry out further trimming and removal of vegetation and trees to make way for the new road upgrade.

Please see map below for location of work.



Work will be carried out from Monday 15th August until Friday 30th September. Some of this work will be carried out between 7am to 6pm on weekdays and 8am to 1pm on Saturdays.

Due to traffic implications and safety risks some of this work must be carried out at night. There will be up to 20 shifts of night work from Monday 15th August until Friday 30th September, between 6pm and 7am, weather permitting.

How will the work affect you?

There may be some lighting and noise associated with the work. Machinery and equipment used may include lighting towers, trucks, chainsaws, small crane, light vehicles and hand tools. Every effort will be made to minimise noise. Lighting towers will be directed away from residential properties wherever possible.

Night work on Frenchs Forest Road, Naree Road and Forest Way from Monday 25th July

Due to the upgrading of roads around the new Northern Beaches Hospital, RMS will be carrying out service relocation work along Forest Way, Naree Road, Frenchs Forest Road West and East, Allambie Road and Russell Avenue and some of this work will be done at night between Monday 25th July and Friday 2nd September. How will the work affect you?


There will be some noise, dust, vibration and disruption associated with this work. Machinery and equipment used may include lighting towers, excavators, trucks, light vehicles, underboring rigs, pole borers, road saws, plate compactors, jackhammers and hand tools. Every effort will be made to minimise noise. Lighting towers will be directed away from residential properties wherever possible.

Traffic changes

For safety reasons there will be some temporary traffic changes including lane closures which may affect travel times. Please keep to speed limits and follow the direction of traffic controllers and signs. For the latest traffic updates call 132 701, visit livetraffic.com or download the Live Traffic NSW App. Pedestrian access will be maintained at all times, although minor temporary detours may be in place during the work.

Speed limit changes on Warringah Road, Wakehurst Parkway, Forest Way and Allambie Road from Monday 22nd August

Roads and Maritime Services will implement speed limit changes along sections of Warringah Road, Wakehurst Parkway, Forest Way and Allambie Road from Monday 22nd August

The speed limit will be reduced from 70km/h to 60km/h on Warringah Road, Wakehurst Parkway and Forest Way, and reduced from 60km/h and 50km/h to 40km/h on Allambie Road. These will be implemented from Monday 22nd August and will be in place until the end of the Northern Beaches Hospital project. Speed limits apply 24 hours, seven days a week (except in school zones where 40km/h speed limits apply)
