## Principal's Report

#### **NAPLAN**

Parents and carers received NAPLAN results this term. We were pleased with the results our students achieved, especially in Year 9 where the learning in high school has the most significant impact, particularly in relation to student growth. Year 7 students have only been at The Forest High School for one term when they sit for the exams meaning that their achievements can mainly be attributed to their learning in primary school.

In Year 7 the school was above state average in reading, spelling, grammar and punctuation and well above state average in numeracy. No growth data was available for writing; however, in numeracy 65.3% of students were equal to or above the expected growth. Year 9 students were well above state average in reading and although no trend or growth data was available for writing, the school was above state average across the top three bands and below state average in the lowest three bands. The school was above state average in spelling, grammar and punctuation and numeracy. More detailed information on the school's NAPLAN results can be found on the My School website and will also be included in our Annual Report, which will be released in April 2017.

#### **PROPERTY WORKS**

This week I signed off on the work that Ferrovial York will be undertaking on school grounds on behalf of RMS. Clearing of trees will commence in these school holidays in preparation for the construction of three new car parks, a new multi-purpose games court, new pathways and landscaping. Construction of the car park behind A Block and the games court will then commence. Construction of the front car park adjacent to the Administration Block is due to be completed in the January school holidays and the construction of the bottom car park will commence shortly afterwards and will take two and half to three months to be completed. As part of this work the bus shelter will be moved and a drop off zone, for parents to drop students in the

morning, will be created in the bottom car park. We look forward to completion of these new facilities.

#### ROTARY CLUB OF AUSTRALIA VOCATIONAL AWARD

I wish to warmly congratulate Ben Goldsmith, Head Teacher Creative and Performing Arts and Relieving Deputy Principal who received the Rotary Club of Australia Vocational Award for Pride of Workmanship this week. Ben received the award in recognition of his educational leadership of creative and performing arts in both the school and the community and for the huge commitment this requires. We are extremely proud of Ben Goldsmith. He is a very worthy recipient of this award.





#### **SENIOR STUDENTS**

I remind all Year 11 and 12 students that they can still make huge progress on their HSC in these final weeks leading up to the examinations. The HSC is 50% of their final mark so no matter what they have achieved to date, it is well worth revising and studying carefully in the lead up to the exams. Students are identified only with a BOSTES number on the HSC and it is each student's performance in relation to other students in the state, not how the school performs, that determines their HSC results and their ATAR. I look forward to farewelling Year 12 students at the Graduation Ceremony in November. Year 12 is an exceptional group of young adults who

have displayed both good will and generosity in the last six years. I wish them all the best in their future endeavours and I encourage them to keep in touch with us.

Lastly I wish the whole school community a safe and happy holiday. School resumes for all staff and students on 10th October.

The school hosted parents and students for the Year 8 into 9 Information Evening and subject selection process. Our 3+3 students completed their trial HSC examination and have been active in completing their study and revision ready for the HSC.

The PDHPE faculty organised the annual Year 10 Ski Trip which was a wonderful experience for the 40 attending students and staff who accompanied them and the CAPA faculty once again demonstrated their amazing creative student talent with MADD Night and the Senior Soiree.

The term came to a close with the SRC Induction Ceremony and the investiture of the new school captains. Congratulations to all the students who were elected to the SRC for 2017 and to Ms Murray for once again coordinating this process.

As Deputy Principal a lot of time is spent on student welfare and management. So it is always a treat for me to be part of special events either out of the school or at school. Early this week I accompanied two Year 10 students, Gabriella A. and Zali V. to Parliament House in Sydney for the annual Jessie Street National Library fundraising luncheon. We were lucky enough to hear Tanya Hosch, a Torres Strait Islander woman, who was the Campaign Director of the RECOGNISE movement which raises community awareness and support to recognise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the Australian Constitution. Tanya also spoke about Jessie Street who was a key figure in Australian political life for over 50 years, from the women's

suffrage struggle in England to the removal of Australia's constitutional discrimination against Aboriginal people in 1967.

#### A STUDENT'S VIEW OF THE 3+3 SYSTEM

As part of the interviews of students who were applying for the position of Student Representative Council member, we spoke to the students about their attitudes to The Forest High School. This led to a frank discussion about how they felt about studying under the 3+3 system. I felt it was worthwhile letting them speak about their personal experiences which may be a guide to parents and students who are still unsure about it. These are their words:

The reason as to why I stayed at The Forest for my last senior years is because I have a very strong relationship with each teacher. They know me well enough to respect me and I feel extremely comfortable and supported doing my HSC with people/teachers that have known me since Year 7 and know how I act in an emotional manner due to stress and personal life. I felt if I moved to a different school in the last, most important years, of my schooling that I would be uncomfortable and afraid to talk to a whole new teaching faculty about my issues and worries. I felt strongly that The Forest High School would be a better, more comfortable support system for me during these last years.

#### Tamika E.

I like the 3+3 system as it is easier to focus on single subjects. As an additional unit to what is required, I do Extension 1 English and with the 3+3 system I find it easier to engage with the course as it is a subject that requires quite a lot of effort to receive good marks. Because I am

focusing on three other subjects instead of the conventional six, I find that I can put as much effort into the Extension course as all of my subjects, which I know students at other schools do not do as they treat it as 'only being one unit'. Overall, after studying for only three or four subjects in exam weeks, I could not imagine having to study for six or seven subjects. Undertaking my first year in the system, I am extremely lucky to have a week in between all my HSC exams, which I know will be valuable time to have to prepare to gain my best ATAR result.

The 3+3 has many positives. The system allows students at The Forest to learn and achieve in a new and evolved manner. It allows kids to focus on just 3 subjects that reduce the content load as well as work load. By integrating the Year 11s with the Year 12s, the junior year will be assisted with study, work and the content in class, allowing a variety of ideas or beliefs to be shared. Not only is the class shared but friendships form and unite the senior cohort. The 3+3 allows students to gain a student/teacher friendship, making it easier to go and communicate with the teachers.

#### Harry W.

Anecdotal evidence from parents and students over the advantages of the 3+3 system also included issues students faced over anxiety, physical health and sporting commitments. Some students and parents expressed concern that students were attempting the HSC exam when they were in Year 11, which might affect their results. Analysis of the 2013-2015 HSC results showed that many Year 11 students achieved strong results, which shows that they are mature enough to undertake the exams. The big difference is a willingness to study hard and work in class, not the age of the student.

Year 11 students achieved comparable numbers of band 5 and 6 results to the Year 12 cohort. Most students reported that they felt more comfortable in Year 12 having successfully completed half their exams and had a greater understanding of the process and exam procedures.














#### **NSWEE**

## **PDHPE**

#### **CROSSROADS**

Our new senior school students will be participating in a **Crossroads** course from **Monday 7th** to **Thursday 10th November** inclusive. **Crossroads** is a mandatory senior PDHPE program for students in NSW government schools. It is designed to help senior students address issues of health, safety and wellbeing at a time when they face significant changes and challenges in their lives. **Crossroads** aims to prepare and support these students as they encounter situations related to identity, independence and their changing responsibilities. **Crossroads** aims to build students' sense of empowerment and respect for themselves and others.

The **Year 10 Motivational Week** has been specifically tailored to meet the needs as identified in our school community. Topics which will be included are:

- Building resilience
- Goal-setting and motivation
- Safe partying
- Respectful relations including sexuality and sexual health
- Managing technology
- Wellbeing activities
- Preparations for senior studies
- Safe travel

A session will involve a group of Northern Beaches General Practitioners visiting the school to inform students about issues relating to youth. They will address the group as a whole for about 30 minutes. Students will then be divided into smaller friendship groups and each group will meet with a GP for a confidential session. In order to maintain confidentiality and allow the students to discuss any topics they choose with the GP, a teacher will not be present in these small groups.

The cost has been included into the Year 9 Camp cost and therefore there is no cost for these students. However, for any student who did not attend the camp there is a small cost of \$20. Students are expected to be in full school uniform for the week. PE uniform is required to be brought to school on Monday and to be worn on Wednesday as normal.


Team **Bittersweet** took third place with their concept black and white "good vs. evil" van. Sporting angel wings it gained almost maximum points in the "best looking car" category.

## Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL)

The Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) Committee is supporting the school's **mini-Olympics** next term. 


#### Installation of electrical wiring along Warringah Road



#### **National Self-Detection Program for Scoliosis (NSDP)**

It is recommended that girls in Year 7 and 9 participate in the NSDP by downloading the Self-Detection Brochure for Scoliosis. The brochure can be accessed directly via a link on the Scoliosis Australia home page at <a href="https://www.scoliosis-australia.org">www.scoliosis-australia.org</a>.

Scoliosis (spinal curvature) is an important health problem for adolescent girls and 25 per thousand are at risk of developing a significant curve. Three girls per thousand require active treatment (spinal brace or surgery). Because in the early stages the condition is most often asymptomatic, screening in the age range 11-13 years is a sound preventative health measure.
