The Use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in Assessments

The unauthorised or unacknowledged use of AI in assessments is a form of cheating and will be considered malpractice. We understand that AI can offer many benefits in terms of efficiency and productivity. We are finding that some students are successfully using AI when developing summary notes and when trying to find information about a particular topic. However, when AI is used in assessments, students are presenting work that is not their own. Note – many writing assistance tools (eg Grammarly) are AI-based. Using these can lead to student work being flagged by our AI detection software. Students are encouraged to use Word/Google Docs spelling and grammar checking tool instead. Students should anticipate submitting all research and hand-in tasks via Turnitin, and that such tasks will be subject to Turnitin's AI detection tool. If unauthorised use of AI is suspected, it is the student's responsibility to prove the originality of their work. In doing so, they may be asked to:

- Provide drafts of their work.
- Meet with the Assessment Review Team to explain how they prepared their assignment.

Therefore, students should keep a record of the ongoing work they have completed on hand-in assessment tasks. As such, it is highly recommended that students work in a cloud-based platform (e.g. Google Docs) should they be required to produce evidence of the originality of their work.

Year 12 English Standard Friday lunch workshops

Each Friday lunch, Mrs Lepre has been walking students through the process of answering the comprehension section of the HSC English Standard examination. Students find the step by step process of answering questions based on unseen texts particularly useful. Students who are interested in being trained up for Paper 1 Section 1 (Reading) before the Trial and HSC examinations can come to the LIBLC every Friday at 1.20pm. Mrs Lepre has extensive HSC marking experience so students are encouraged to take up this opportunity.

ICAS Academic Competitions

Thanks to Mrs Lepre for organising our ICAS assessments. These are a great way for students to test themselves against other students from across the globe. All students in Years 7 to 10 are invited to participate in the 2024 English, Mathematics, Science, Spelling and Digital Technologies competitions. Students who want extra opportunities to gain a measure of their own achievement in an external assessment situation or to become accustomed to competitive external testing with time constraints, can enter the ICAS competitions. They will receive a certificate and a detailed results letter indicating overall performance compared with other students in every participating state and country.
